Snails and Slugs - Be Gone

Caffeine is an excellent pesticide for snails and slugs. The use rate is about 2-3% solution in water. That's about $1 \frac{1}{2} - 20z$. per gallon of spray. My research (source is the F.D.A.) tells me that the spray is safe around pets and even children. Caffeine breaks down rapidly in the garden, lasting only about 3 days. The byproducts are harmless. It doesn't appear to harm beneficial critters like incarsia wasps or bees. Nope, it's not effective on ants. It kills snails and slugs by rapidly paralyzing their nervous systems. We water it into the pots directly after spraying the plants. You have to search the net a bit to find "reasonable" prices. It's still a bit on the expensive side. I figure it costs about \$25 to spray your yard. Often we can go for two years between sprays. It gets them all....

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SCOS' Q & A Column

Did you ever wonder how our plants are judged each month? I did, and now that I am the stuckee for ribbon judging, it is my job to answer that question. So, here are some thoughts about a set of guidelines for judg-ing our plants. As always, suggestions and comments are welcome.

It seems to me the most fundamental requirement is that the plant be an orchid. That's the easy part. It should be accurately identified by a name that allows for tracing the ancestry of the plant, and placing in the correct category for judging. The categories are currently consistent with divisions of the orchid family at the subtribe level. (For those in need of a little taxonomy, the orchid family is divided into subfamilies, then tribes, then subtribes, before arriving at genera. Generally, orchid species are identified by their genus and species name.) A subtribe grouping allows us to collect a reasonable number of orchids in each category - enough to have a contest, but not so many that good plants go unrewarded. Hybrids generally fit into a sub-tribe, and those that don't can be grouped according to flower characteristics consistent with one of the sub-tribes. Should plants that cannot be identified (the old lost nametag problem) be given a separate category?

I believe that we are rewarding the grower of the plant, whose hard work has resulted in one or more beautiful flowers. Hence, we may require that a plant be under the care of our members for at least six months. This is long enough to kill a plant (as I have done much too often), and also long enough to assure any bloom is the creation of its keeper. This same rule was in use in the Malibu Orchid Society (MOS) when I last attended a meeting.

Some of our members are new to orchids; some just need a little more time to get the hang of orchid growing. Should we have a beginner's category? This would (hopefully) encourage newcomers, and those less sure of their skills, that we have a place for their plants, and their participation is valued.

What are our ribbons? We currently have four ribbons that may be awarded in each category: first, second, third, and cultural. I believe the first, second and third place awards should be for flower quality, and the cultural award should be for excellence in growing the plant. This would make SCOS judging more consistent with AOS judging. Should judges be required to give out all four ribbons each month, or is it possible that one or more ribbons may not be awarded? What if there are two outstanding flowers in a category? Should more than one first place ribbon be awarded in exceptional cases?

If the first, second and third place ribbons are to be awarded on flower quality, where does that leave a plant that is displayed well? Do we also need a display category, that cuts across each of the other categories to recognize the overall appearance of the plant and its presentation? To the extent the SCOS and its members participate in orchid shows, this is a talent we should cultivate.

Given that we have so many categories and ribbons to award, I recommend we adopt a cost-saving measure recommended at the May meeting: ribbon winners, who turn back in their ribbons, are to get a raffle ticket for each ribbon returned. The award will still be recognized in the newsletter, and the points counted toward year totals; and the SCOS will save on ribbon costs. (An alternative I find less appealing is to present stickers instead of ribbons.)

Finally, I want to assure everyone that these will be guidelines, and that we do not intend to become too rigid, and take the fun out of displaying our beloved orchids. For those with expert qualifications, there is always the AOS judging in the room adjoining our meeting place.
