As announced in the December Bulletin, the speaker of the evening will be Dr. Lee W. Lenz of Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Gardens, Claremont, where he is the plant breeder and geneticist. He likes all orchids but has largely restricted his collection to cypripedium, having some of the very best hybrid cypripedium in the world. NOVICE CLASS

He gave a demonstration of repotting Cattleyas, using three different media: fir bark, firbard and palco chips and in hapu. He announced that a mixture of hapu and fir bark is now being used extensively in the Islands. There was much discussion of the control of fungi, mildew, and pests. Two helpful hints for the novice were these: Do not turn off the pilot of your heater in the greenhouse during the summer; and always use rubber gloves when dipping plants in fungicide as many of these are toxic to humans - the effects often being cumulative. Next month, the Class will meet at the home of Mrs. Pearl Lumley, 3955 Locust, Long Beach 7, February 7, 1960.
