MAIL: Just received -- the Malayan Orchid Review. This was Printed in June, Mailed in October. There is such a thing as a "Slow Boat from China." In this issue, there is an article by Judith MacDougal on the Haemaria discolor.

She states that it has taken her seven years of "affectionate amateur's patience to overcome it's reluctance to thrive in her Singapore garden." This plant is in a round shallow seashell (7" diameter) instead of a pot, it receives about twenty minutes direct sun between 8 and 9 A.M. Judith MacDougal's description of the plant wants me to rush right out and purchase one. Read on - "Before preparing these notes, I took a long look at those unbelievable leaves through my magnifying glass and discovered that the astonishing glitter of the veins seems to be caused by a powdering of minute rubies! And to all the descriptions of the colours of the leaves themselves, add another . . . it is as though they were woven from shimmering silken threads - a blending of cinnamon, purple, olive and moss green. And the flowers? A delicate foil in form and colour." See what I mean. Has anyone a Haemaria discolor?

WEED: If you are interested in trying to grow the first true yellow Saintpaulia, contact the African Violet Laboratory, 2552 Broadway, Toledo, Ohio, for X-rayed, rooted leaves.

BANANA PEELS: The slippery yellow skins are high in potash and decay rapidly in soil due to their high water content. The banana peel method should help rose bushes flourish with larger, fuller and more beautiful roses as a result. Six to nine peels can be safely used at one time. Peels should be mashed into the soil around the rose bush; it's not necessary to cut them up or bury them deep, but the peels should be covered lightly with soil under the leaf area of the rose plant. - - - Has anyone tried this on Orchids?
