CYPRIPEDIUM HYBRID"

To most of us it is a mystery how the beautiful modern day hybrid was ever developed from the insignificant species that exist in nature. We are very fortunate to have Mr. Wilcox demonstrate to us how this can be done. By the use of a collection of Kodachromes, built up through the years, he will take us step by step through the building of a beautiful hybrid from the original jungle collected species. With some twenty odd years experience in growing and hybridizing to back him

up, Mr. Wilcox is one of our most qualified Cypripedium growers today. Originally starting with most of the more popular genera, he has let his interest in Cypripediums gradually crowd out all other orchids. Today he has a collection of some 5000 Cyps in which he specializes exclusively. His success is amply demonstrated by the awards that are being won by his crosses. Among those recently awarded are Cyp. Green Tippe, Jim Dandy and Roseling. Mr. Wilcox's contributions to the orchid world lies not exclusively in the hybridizing field. He has been active in the Societies and has played an important part in getting judging established in this area. He was one of the original judges for the Orchid Society of Southern California when they inaugurated judging many years ago. He was among the first three American Orchid Society judges certified on the West Coast and is also a certified Orchid Digest Corp. and a Cymbidium Society judge.

It is not often we are so fortunate to obtain a speaker so well versed and qualified. This is a program that should not be missed by anyone who is seriously interested in increasing his knowledge of orchids.

Sixteen Plants were entered for judging of which the following six received awards. Award No.

Lc. Bonanza "Klondike", A.M., 80.2 points. Shown by B. O. Bracey. 150 Four medium lavender flowers, with magenta lips veined gold. Natural spread 7 inches.

C. Mary Langford "Olympus". H.C.C., 76.7 points. Shown by B. O. Bracey. 151 Two clear white flowers with gold veining in heavily ruffled lips. Natural spread 7¼ inches.

Blc. Ojai "Verte" H.C.C., 79.5 points. Shown by Mrs. John Hanes. 152 Two stems of two flowers each with chartreuse green sepals and petals and large ruffled lip veined red and gold. Natural spread 6½ inches.

(Note: Blc. Ojai "Verte" has previously received a Bronze (H.C.C.) award from the Orchid Digest Corp and is therefore not eligible for another Bronze (H.C.C.) from the Digest. However, the South Coast Orchid Society H.C.C. will be issued as this was the first time this plant was judged by the South Coast Society)

Cyp. Seascape "Shaws Garden", H.C.C., 75.8 points. Shown by H. A. Hecht.

153 A full round flower predominantly maroon with green shading. Natural spread 4 inches. Cym. Bodmin Moor "Victoria" H.C.C., 76.8 points. Shown by R. J. Chrisman. 154

A stem of fifteen green flushed white blossoms with a pink edging on lower margin of the lips. Natural spread 4 % inches.

Cym. Princess Elizabeth "Novia" H.C.C., 79 points. Shown by R. J. Chrisman. 155 Ten blush white flowers with a few maroon dots on margin of lip. Natural spread 41/4 inches.
